Appleyard Crescent

3, 4, 122, 125 1920. 2-storey cottage. Red brick, pantile roof. Vernacular style. Special corner type, upper storey rendered. 6 pane casement windows. Bay windows (60°) to ground floor. Exceptions: some windows replaced, without sash bars in nos. 3, 125. *The Boundary Public 1928. Public House. Hipped roof (plain tiles) with low eaves. Buff bricks. Central Mock timber framed House gable and adjacent dormers. Timber framed leaded windows. Importance: a local landmark designed in a style typical of the period. *Pavilions and 1929 Concrete Pavilions and feature arcade in arcades, Mile Cross south garden. Arcade in dilapidated state. Importance: These structures are integral features Gardens within the original plan for the gardens established by Capt Sandys-Winsch. *St Catherine's Two storey house. Buff brick and blue pantiles. Timber framed windows. Vicarage Importance: part of a group of community buildings. *Mile Cross Library 1931. Red brick and pebbledash and red pantiles. Timber framed windows. Importance: An important community building designed in a typical interwar style. Aylsham Road

384-398 (even)C1920. Houses in terraces of 4. 2-storey, red
brick pantile roof. Georgian style doorcases with
fanlight with 12 pane sashes each side of door and
featuring circular windows above doors to centre
cottages. Hedges on front boundary.
Exceptions: Hedge removed 388 ad 390
No front garden 400-404. Terrace of 3 nos. 408-
412
Sash bars removed 412

Bolingbroke Road

C1920. Same design as Losinga Crescent and Aylsham Road above. Exception: No.72 – windows replaced.
C1920 variant design with lowered half storey roof and feature gable at front. Exception: No.4 – new forward extension, windows replaced
1928. Shopping parade with flats above and dormer windows. Symmetrical plan either side of Mile Cross Lane. Red brick and red pantiles. Importance: landmark buildings which provide importance functions for the community.
1929. Former Galley Hill Public House. Early 20th century public house designed for Norwich Brewer Steward and Patterson. Mock timber framing. Unfortunately the original Steward & Patterson windows have been removed. Importance: An important landmark building in the estate.
 C1920. 2-storey red brick, pantile roof. In short terrace with link walls. Georgian style door cases with fanlights and 12 pane sashes, as in Aylsham Road. Exceptions: 5: porch added 11: windows replaced, leaded lozenges 15: windows replaced with sash bars, UPVC 21: porch added 33: windows replaced 39: windows replaced

Rye Avenue

2 and 4	C1920. Design as for Losinga Crescent. Exception: hedges removed.
56, 58	C1920. Design as for 32 Suckling Avenue (see below)
69-75 (odd)	C1920. Corner house type, variant on Suckling Avenue design. 2 storey, red brick with upper storey rendered, roofs pantiled (replacement). 6 pane casements. Bay window (60°) to ground floor
97 – 103 (odd)	As above Exceptions: 97, 99 and 101 have replacement windows without sash bays

1-32 (consec.)	C1920. 2 storey cottages, red brick

Nos. 1016 feature pilasters at end of terrace of four. Square ground floor bay windows. Casements with sash bars. Nos. 17-20 have variant design without pilasters and bays. Nos. 21-32 have variant design with 60° bay windows on ground floor Exceptions: Replacement or altered windows omitting sash bars – 4, 6, 19, 20, 22, 24, 28 and 32
