A tale of two cities

 Fast growing – economic, social, cultural and environmental influence out of proportion to size

Vs

 Poor job opportunities, low pay, significant differences in life expectancy across wards and only 45% of students gaining 5 or more GCSE's



more than a home for the homeless



Across England

 England (2017) 307,000 people homeless or living in inadequate accommodation – 4,751 rough sleepers – 15% more than 2016

169% increase since 2010





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East of England

- More than 20,000 people are homeless
- Street Count Nov 2017: Norwich (30), Kings Lynn and West Norfolk (9) and Waveney (8)
- Norwich Outreach (Pathways): July (19) August (26), September (34) October (42)



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Why?


- Social Housing has reduced 20% since 2011
- Affordable housing?
- Affordable rents 80% of market value
- Wages flat lining
- Benefit reforms = benefit cuts 42 since 2010
- Poor transition procedures
- The human factor

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By 2041 (23 years) prediction for number of rough sleepers across the UK:

- 40,100 (2017 4,751)
- 744% increase

Greater Norwich Homelessness Strategy 2015 -2020

Broadland, Norwich and South Norfolk Councils working together to address 4 key areas:

- target resources at those people who are most at risk of homelessness
- help people find affordable, safe, good quality housing
- work better together with partners, so that we can work in a co-ordinated way to prevent homelessness
- help people develop independent living skills, maintain or regain their independence to reduce the risk of someone becoming homeless in the future.

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St Martins 2019 - 2021 Strategy

During 2019 – 2021 we have identified 6 key ambitions. These are:

- to prevent homelessness wherever possible
- to deliver crisis support
- to deliver sustained support
- to continue to be an employer of choice
- to continue to be well managed and efficient
- to communicate clearly.



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The big things for St Martins

- Prevention (including mental health services) is important; it reduces homelessness and pressure on crisis services
- We will develop a new Housing First 20 bed project
- We will be piloting new fundraising initiatives (including contactless payment machines)
- We will be implementing our legacy income strategy
- We will be working on increasing the number of our volunteers and making sure they feel supported
