

# STAGE 1 Survey

Members of the public were invited to complete a survey relating to the vision, opportunities for potential uses including housing, open space, community facilities, employment and jobs, and issues relating to sustainability, transport, access, movement and heritage assets. There was also an opportunity to provide any other views respondents had on the issues and opportunities presented by the East Norwich sites not captured through the survey. Respondents were also asked questions about themselves, including their identified gender, age, and location in relation to the site.

In total, 224 people responded to the survey. A summary of the responses received is provided here.







## Questions about the Vision

The vision for East Norwich is currently as follows...

"East Norwich will become a highly sustainable new quarter for the City, accommodating substantial housing growth and optimising strategic economic benefits. It will be an inclusive, resilient and safe community in which people of all ages have good access to high quality homes that meet housing needs, and to strategic and local employment opportunities; can interact socially in green spaces and in new community facilities; and have the opportunity for independent, healthy and active lifestyles. The new quarter will link the city centre with the Broads, and deliver exemplar design. The area's riverside regeneration potential will be maximised to achieve a distinct sense of place with enhanced opportunities for river-based activity. The site has the ability to facilitate improved public transport, including rail services, which will benefit East Norwich and the city generally."












The sites have not been accessible to the public for many many years. New development brings the opportunity for new open spaces to be created.


















"Enhanced cycling infrastructure linking from east to west of city centre"

"Providing outdoor spaces within the development instead of relying on Whitlingham park and the surrounding area."

"The creation of more wildlife habitat, increased biodiversity and halting climate emissions..."

"Removal of traffic up bracondale in to the city and swing bridge pinch point. It makes sense to add another crossing so pressure comes off the swing especially on match days when it is closed. This will then allow future planning away from car traffic in future years as transport can be moved away from residential areas and encourage healthy activity in around the riverside and reduce pollution. I would suggest an additional bridge via access from the roundabout across to the football ground so ring road traffic can continue that way removing the central inbound lane traffic from Bracondale"



## Other...

"Promoting community-owned clean energy infrastructure to support the site's energy requirements."

"No new building anywhere not on a hill in Norfolk. Or else substantial proportions of the budget devoted to coastal flood defences and generous relocation packages for the folks who will be made homeless by your plans in 50 years time."

"Invest in the right design and architecture advice to ensure the area evolves and matures to the needs of those who use it over time - avoid institutional approach!"

"Don't build new developments, prioritise nature instead."

"Areas that may carry a risk of residual water and occasional floods can still be used, you just need to develop houses to suit the purpose and build them off the ground. There is an array of buildings in European countries that already practice this and have done for years."

"Designing buildings to high quality standards to last as long as possible so there is no need to replace them for as long as possible."

"Understanding that this is Norfolk, not London, and most families have at least one car and need it to get around as the whole of Norfolk's public transportation system is utter rubbish."


"Keeping traffic out of the area and away from Trowse, county hall, bracondale etc, no building on flood plains I.e the deal ground."


