# Introduction



The State of Norwich uses key datasets and metrics that can be compared with other places and observed over time to help the council, partners, stakeholders and residents develop a shared, long-term view of the city.

The purpose of this evidence base is to create a framework to monitor collective progress towards the <u>City Vision (pdf)</u> goals, to monitor contextual trends and inform decision-making on shared strategic issues, both within the council and across our key partnerships.

This high-level infographic is organised around four key themes: PEOPLE – PLACE – ECONOMY - WELLBEING



Norwich and its residents have a lot to be proud of, but as with any city, it faces some challenges including significant and entrenched inequality and deprivation. Some 40% of <u>Lower Super Output Areas</u> (LSOAs) in Norwich are among the most deprived 20% of LSOAs in England.

These spatial disparities in deprivation have significant impacts on the life chances, social mobility and outcomes of individuals and the wider communities in which they live.


Norwich has experienced <u>significant population growth</u> over the last decade and is growing younger, with an average age of 34 years.

By 2028, <u>population projections</u> indicate Norwich will have the lowest proportion of people aged 65 and over (16.2%) and the highest proportion of people aged under 25 (35.9%) of any Norfolk district, with the latter related in part to the city's large student population.



Ethnic diversity in Norwich sits <u>below the national average</u>, however, the <u>proportion of people of an ethnic</u> group other than White (12.9%) is the highest of any Norfolk district.







Norwich is a contemporary city with a medieval heart, which seamlessly combines the modern with the historic. A lively urban centre, and, despite the challenges of recent years, a thriving <u>Fast Growth City</u> with a bustling arts and culture scene.

Over the period 2005-2021, CO2 emissions from industry fell by two-thirds in Norwich and domestic emissions reduced by one-third.

At a local authority level, Norwich City Council continues to implement an ambitious programme to reduce its own carbon emissions and has made a 71.1% carbon reduction against its target to become zero carbon by 2030.



Norwich saw the East of England's <u>largest percentage point fall in the proportion of social rented sector</u> <u>households</u> between the 2011 and 2021 census. Despite this, Norwich sits in the highest 3% of English local authority areas for the share of households in the social rented sector, with a social housing stock of c14,500.


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Norwich ranked as the highest performing city in the East of England region in the PwC's 2023'Good Growth for Cities' Index.



# NORWICH economy

The diversity of Norwich's economy is one of its greatest strengths, helping the city to remain relatively stable during financial challenges, such as Covid-19, and more recently, the war in Ukraine.

Whilst Norwich's <u>current productivity</u> (GVA per hour worked) is below average, it has increased by 43% over the last decade – far in excess of UK growth of 24%.

Norwich boasts six key growth sectors which employ an estimated 30,000 people across knowledge intensive business services.

Despite these strengths, Norwich faces structural challenges around managing <u>sustainable</u>, <u>inclusive economic growth</u> for the future.


# These include:

- Physical infrastructure and transport constraints that are hindering growth
- A higher-than-average incidence of part-time working
- Poorly paid and insecure employment in relatively low-skilled jobs in sectors which are likely to see significant contraction as technology replaces many roles
- Resident and workplace earnings that are below the national average

## **TOP 5 SECTORS BY EMPLOYMENT**



Norwich is forecasted lower growth than other cities in the East of England.

This is largely driven by the above-average proportion of economic activity in the public administration and defence sector, which is predicted to be the third-worst performing sector in 2023 and 2024.



Like many cities across the country, the cost of living has risen drastically in Norwich. The city sits in the third highest quartile against the Cost of Living Vulnerability Index with a score of 978, which sits above the average for all English district local authorities (749).

This means residents are particularly vulnerable to being pulled into poverty or being pushed into destitution if they were already struggling to make ends meet.

The disparity in inflation rates and nominal wage growth demonstrates the strain rising prices are placing on standards of living: workers living in Norwich were on average £101 a month poorer in January 2023 than the previous year.



The Index of Multiple Deprivation (2019) is the official measure of relative deprivation for small areas or neighbourhoods in England. The Education, Skills and Training domain specifically measures the lack of attainment and skills and educational disadvantage within a local area. For Norwich, <u>36.1% of LSOAs fall within the top 10% most deprived areas in England for educational attainment.</u>




