

#### Cities Outlook 2023

The Centre for Cities recently published its flagship <u>Cities Outlook 2023 report (pdf)</u>, outlining the latest economic data on the UK's cities and largest towns. The report highlights the scale and geographies of economic inactivity and their close links to regional inequalities. Key highlights of the report include:


- UK unemployment triples from 3.7% to 12.1% when including 3 million economically inactive people. This accounts for those who are unemployed but not actively seeking employment due to factors such as poor health or being discouraged by poor job prospects.
- Nine of 10 cities and towns with the highest hidden unemployment rates are in the North, as demonstrated in the map below and <u>UK unemployment tracker</u>.
- The report calls for the government to deliver the levelling up agenda by boosting skills and supporting job creation in struggling urban areas.



### Levelling Up: Round two

Successful bids in the second round of Levelling Up funding were announced by the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities on 19 January 2023, with £672m allocated to develop better transport links, £821m awarded to regeneration projects and £594m given to restore local heritage. Central government's competitive bidding approach to funding local authorities continues to be the subject of critique and controversy, with nearly 4 out of 5 bids unsuccessful in <a href="the latest bidding round">the latest bidding round</a> and almost a quarter of the 100 most deprived areas in the UK receiving no funding from either round of Levelling Up. # Local government funding arrangements

The deputy chief economist for the Institute for Government calls for a broader set of reforms and policies to tackle regional inequalities, including devolution in a <u>recent</u> <u>Levelling Up article</u> that argues:

- The Levelling Up Fund is neither large enough not targeted enough to regenerate left-behind regions.
- The competitive bidding process is inefficient and ineffective, with a recent Freedom of Information request indicating local authorities have spent at least £27m preparing bids for various levelling up funds.
- More ambitious policies and reforms are needed.

# Health & Wellbeing Partnership

Through the Health and Care Act 2022, the establishment of our Norwich Health and Wellbeing Partnership has already helped to make a difference with essential

funding of almost £350,00 being awarded to city-based projects and organisations who work to improve wellbeing and tackle health inequalities in Norwich which were impacted or made worse by Covid 19.

These include:

- Norfolk Community Advice Network (NCAN)
- Leeway
- Active Norfolk
- Interact

Following the recent workshop held with partners from across the city, the Health and Wellbeing Strategy is taking shape focusing on three priority areas: social and economic wellbeing; mental and physical health and wellbeing; and community resilience and voice. We plan to hear more from the Health and Wellbeing Partnership at future City Vision meetings.
